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## From the Head of College

A major focus for the College during the next period of strategic planning will be the shift towards aligning resources across a three-campus ELC to 12 structure. In 2023 we have already put additional specialist subjects in Music, Drama and STEM at the two primary campuses. Over time, we will include more specialist offerings where skilled teachers will teach certain subjects across a full range of year levels.

By providing a comprehensive and continuous ELC-12 education, students can explore their interests and discover new ones, helping to foster a lifelong love of learning. Exposure to wide-ranging subject offerings across a school journey can help students develop a broader perspective and better understand the world around them.

Another benefit of an ELC-12 school is that it can provide students with more seamless transitions during critical milestones such as the move from Primary to Middle School or Middle to Senior School. Skills and knowledge will be built incrementally and intentionally using a consistent instructional model, which students can relate to as their learning becomes more complex in terms of the skills and knowledge which need to be applied.

By providing students with a comprehensive and dynamic education, ELC-12 schools help to prepare students for the challenges and opportunities they will face in the future. This continued focus on building the skills and dispositions to prepare students for a rapidly changing future will be significantly enhanced through the opportunities which come from more diverse ELC-12 educational programs, where wellbeing and learning are deeply interconnected.

Concordia has already committed to a priority focus of building a consistent ELC-12 pedagogical focus in 2023. Students will see the results of this focus during the year and have the chance to provide direct feedback to their teachers. This ELC-12 focus will provide an

excellent platform to provide consistency of high-quality teaching across all classes for every learner.

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## **School Immunisation Program First Visit - Years 7 and 8, Friday 10 March**

**2023**

## First Visit Reminder for Parents/Caregivers of Year 7 and Year 8 Students

- one dose of the Human Papillomavirus Vaccine, Gardasil®9
- one dose of the diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough vaccine, Boostrix®

The Eastern Health Authority (EHA) will be visiting Concordia College on **Friday 10 March** to complete the Human Papillomavirus (HPV), Gardasil®9, diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough vaccine and Boostrix® immunisations for Year 7 and 8 students where consent has been provided.

*Please note: From Monday 6 February 2023, the routine two-dose HPV vaccine schedule provided to both year levels through the National Immunisation Program will become a single dose schedule using the same vaccine being Gardasil. Please download a factsheet for more information. As your School Immunisation Provider, EHA would like to confirm that the scheduled first visit date, for Year 7 and 8 only, will remain as previously organised but they will remove the second visit as it is not required as per the new recommendations.*

If you did not receive an immunisation consent form from your child, please ask at the school office for one, if unavailable contact EHA on 8132 3600.

**Please note: All parents/legal guardians are to complete, sign and return the Consent Cards, even if you do not consent for the student to be vaccinated at school.**

If any information you gave on the original consent form has changed, please inform the Authority's immunisation staff before the date of vaccination on 8132 3600.

Please notify us if:

- Your child has already completed the HPV, diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough, Gardasil®9 vaccine and/or Boostrix® immunisation program with another provider.
- You wish to withdraw your consent.
- Your child's medical condition has changed.

Remember: It is your responsibility to advise the vaccinator on the day of immunisation of any change in the information on the consent form, in particular, your child's medical condition. A signed and dated note presented to the vaccinator on the day of immunisation, from a parent or guardian in your child's diary is acceptable.

## Inclusion in Education

This year we are working to further develop and improve our inclusive practice to support the varied needs of all students. Students experience inclusive education when they can access and fully participate in learning, alongside their similar-aged peers, supported by reasonable adjustments and teaching strategies tailored to meet their individual needs. Inclusion is embedded in all aspects of school life, and is supported by culture, policies and everyday practices. It is a legally supported, evidence-based way of delivering education that recognises the individual characteristics of all students and respects the right of every child to be a part of their learning community.

### **Inclusion IS:**

- all students included in the general education classroom all day, every day;
- all students working in a naturally supportive environment with flexible structures and groupings with other students regardless of individual ability;
- all students presumed competent;
- students are supported (where needed, such as through curriculum adaptations, reasonable adjustment and differentiated teaching) to access the core curriculum;
- all students are known and valued as full members of the school community, developing meaningful social relationships with peers and able to participate in all aspects of the life of the school.

### **Inclusion IS NOT:**

- segregation of students with disability in "special" schools, units or classrooms;
- students only being allowed to participate in the general education classroom if they are "keeping up"– this includes:
  - frequent "pull-outs";
  - working separately in a corner of the classroom with the education assistant while the teacher instructs the rest of the class; or
  - students being given a separate "special curriculum" or "program" (as opposed to being supported where needed, including through curricular adjustments, to access the same core curriculum); or
  - demonstrating independence or self-sufficiency as a condition of entry.

The Inclusive Learning teacher's main role is to support the classroom teacher in enabling

students with disability to access and participate in the curriculum on the same basis as their similar-aged peers. We liaise with parents, classroom teachers and therapists to ensure the educational priorities for students with disability are met. We assist teachers in the provision of resources, create differentiated curriculum plans and share strategies to enable teachers to work effectively with students with identified needs. We also engage with students to ensure their learning needs are met, to create Student Support Plans and provide additional intervention in collaboration with their class teacher.
