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Year 7 and 8 Immunisation Reminder

Immunisation Information for Parents/Legal Guardians of Year 7 and 8 Students

The SA 2023 School Immunisation Program will be delivered by [Eastern Health Authority \(EHA\)](#) on **Friday 10 March 2023**.

All Year 7 & 8 students will be offered:

- 1 dose of the human papillomavirus vaccine, Gardasil®9
- 1 dose of the diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough vaccine, Boostrix®

Immunisation consent packs were given out at the beginning of the school year with information about the vaccines on offer. It is important that you have read the information supplied in the packs before you give consent for your child to be vaccinated at school. If you did not receive an Immunisation Consent pack from your child, please ask at the school office.

Please notify EHA if:

- Your child has already started the above program with another provider
- You wish to withdraw your consent
- Your child's medical condition has changed

Tips for the day of immunisation:

- Encourage your child to have a good breakfast and recess on the morning of immunisations
- Wear sports uniforms to aid easy access to the upper arm and avoid unnecessarily exposing yourself if clothing needs to be removed/undone
- Encourage your child to keep their arms moving and drink plenty of water throughout the day.

Remember: It is your responsibility to notify EHA of any changes or information, particularly in relation to your child's medical condition. If any information you gave on the original consent form has changed, please inform EHA Immunisation staff before the day on 8132 3600. Otherwise a handwritten (signed and dated) note can be given on the day via your child to one of the Immunisation nurses.

School Immunisation Program records will be available on MyGov within 24 hours of the school visit

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Australian Computational and Linguistics Olympiad (OzCLO)

Last week, three teams of students from Year 10 and Year 11 competed in Round 1 of The Australian Computational and Linguistics Olympiad (OzCLO). This is a volunteer-run contest about language for secondary school students. The contest challenges students with fiendish and fun linguistic problems. Their mission, in teams of four, is to solve problems about fascinating real languages. In previous years there have been puzzles to solve using extracts from:

- *Arhuaco* – a language spoken by the Arhuaco people in Northern Colombia
- *Wik-Mungkan* - a Paman language spoken on the western side of Cape York Peninsula in Queensland, Australia by around 1,650 people, most of whom live at Aurukun
- *Tzeltal* - a Mayan language spoken by about 450,000 people in the Mexican state of Chiapas
- *Ligurian* - a Romance language spoken by approximately 500,000 people in the Liguria region of Northern Italy.

The challenging competition is perfect for those who love solving puzzles and for those who enjoy learning languages, maths or computing, as many of the skills are transferable.

Congratulations to all our teams who demonstrated incredible focus, collaboration and problem solving on the day.
