I am extremely confident that the deep learning and innovation that has resulted from these professional experiences will have a powerful impact and benefit for our young people, as we aspire to connect, challenge and empower them in their education.

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Year 10 Immunisations - Friday 19 May

Immunisation Information for Parents/Legal Guardians of Year 10 Students

The SA 2023 School Immunisation Program will be delivered by **Eastern Health Authority (EHA) on Friday 19 May.**

All Year 10 students will be offered:

- 2 doses of the meningococcal B vaccine, Bexsero® at 2 separate visits (2 months apart)
- 1 dose of the meningococcal ACWY vaccine, Nimenrix®

Immunisation Consent packs were given out at the beginning of the school year with information about the vaccines on offer. It is important that you have read the information supplied in the packs before you give consent for your child to be vaccinated at school. If you did not receive an Immunisation Consent pack from your child, please ask at the school office.

Please notify EHA if:

- Your child has already started the above program with another provider
- You wish to withdraw your consent
- Your child's medical condition has changed

Tips for the day of immunisation:

- Encourage your child to have a good breakfast and recess on the morning of immunisations
- Wear sports uniforms to aid easy access to the upper arm and avoid unnecessarily exposing yourself if clothing needs to be removed/undone
- Encourage your child to keep their arms moving and drink plenty of water throughout the day.

Remember: it is your responsibility to notify EHA of any changes or information, particularly in relation to your child's medical condition. A signed and dated note in your child's diary from a parent or guardian presented on the day is acceptable.

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Update: Artificial Intelligence in Education at Concordia

Artificial Intelligence (AI) is increasingly becoming a part of our daily lives. At Concordia College we recognise that AI tools can enhance the learning experience for our students. However, it is also important to understand the appropriate use of AI and chatbots and how they can impact academic integrity.

AI tools such as ChatGPT can be used by students to assist with ideation, research, writing and language skills. These tools are particularly helpful for generating ideas, providing information and structure for written assignments, and improving grammar and vocabulary. However, it is crucial to remember that the final submission must demonstrate students' learning and understanding of the subject content and skills. Any information obtained from AI tools must be used by students in a way that demonstrates their own thinking and learning, be properly cited, and should not be submitted as their own work. As with other sources of information, such as the Internet, inappropriate use or plagiarism will result in appropriate consequences.

To ensure that students are using AI tools appropriately, teachers use strategies such as providing feedback during the learning process on both student and machine-generated learning and should have access to student work through OneNote or OneDrive. Students will be encouraged to demonstrate their learning if using AI-generated information and are reminded to seek assistance from teachers and other academic support resources if they have any questions or concerns about using AI tools or academic integrity.

It is essential to note that some AI tools have shortcomings, such as outdated and inaccurate information, biased data and a lack of contextual knowledge. Therefore, students must verify information generated by AI tools with other sources and understand that the references provided by AI may be irrelevant or made up.

In summary, AI tools and chatbots are useful resources that can enhance the learning experience for students when used appropriately. At Concordia College, we encourage our students to use a blended approach to AI tools, leveraging the strengths of both human and machine learning. In fact, the structure for this article initially came from a chatbot with human manipulation to produce the finished version.

They spent their days visiting Parliament House, viewing the Magna Carta, the National Gallery, the National Portrait Gallery, Old Parliament House (Our Voices, Our Choices Gough Whitlam dismissal - Malcolm Fraser - Refugee Crisis - Behind the Lines at the Museum of Australian Democracy), the Australian War Memorial, the High Court of Australia, Reconciliation Place, and the National Film and Sound Archive. Students were given opportunities to participate in a variety of educational programs with a focus on Australia's legal system, history, culture, heritage and democracy and more importantly the tour aligned directly with the Year 12 SACE Legal Studies course relating to the three topics being studied: Sources of Law, Dispute Resolution and the Constitution.

The Australian Government recognises the importance of all young Australians being able to visit the national capital as part of their Civics and Citizenship education. To assist families in meeting the cost of the excursion, the Australian Government contributed funding of \$90 per student under the Parliament and Civics Education Rebate program towards those costs. The rebate is paid directly to the school upon completion of the excursion and made up part of the subsidised costs that parents incurred for the study tour.

A special thanks to Rachael Bennett for her expertise, guidance and for giving up three days of her Term 1 holidays to accompany the class to Canberra.

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Inclusive Learning Update - Sensory and Fidget Tools

As we continue to adapt to the changing needs of our diverse student population, we are committed to providing an inclusive and supportive learning environment for all students. This includes recognising and addressing the needs of students who may benefit from sensory and fidget tools in the classroom.

Sensory and fidget tools are designed to provide students with a way to self-regulate and maintain focus during classroom activities. For some students, sitting still and paying attention for extended periods of time can be challenging, and sensory or fidget tools can help to alleviate anxiety and increase focus.

We want to ensure that all students feel comfortable and supported in using sensory and fidget tools in the classroom, and that these tools do not distract other students from their own learning. To that end, we have established the following guidelines for using sensory and fidget tools in the classroom:

1. Students are welcome to bring and use their own sensory or fidget tools in class, as long as they don't pose a safety risk or distract other students from their learning.
2. If a student is using a tool that is distracting to other students, the teacher may ask the student to use the tool in a less disruptive way, or to choose a different tool that is less disruptive.
3. Students are responsible for keeping their tools in good condition and not using them in a way that could cause damage or harm to themselves or others.

We hope that these guidelines will help to ensure that all students feel supported in using sensory and fidget tools in the classroom. We recognise that each student is unique and may have diverse needs, and we are committed to working with students and parents to find solutions that support each student's learning and wellbeing.

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Year 6 German Excursion

On Tuesday 11 April the St John's Campus Year 6 classes took part in a cultural learning experience, visiting Hahndorf for a historical walk and tour of the famous town. It also incorporated a special visit to the original homestead of the Paech family (the owners of Beerenberg Strawberry Farm).

In the afternoon, students were treated to an interactive performance by "Bund der Bayern" the local South Australian Bavarian dance group. Students had the opportunity to learn the famous "Schuhplaettler" dance as well as experience traditional bell ringing and the piano accordion. The experience was organised as part of our 'Where We Are in Place and Time' unit of work.
