But there is no doubt that a terrific trio: student + teacher + parents/caregivers (note that students come first) is a winning combination to help students to achieve their very best and to graduate from Concordia with confidence in what they can achieve and contribute to their world.

Sure, some of us might be 'nice', some of us might be 'different' and some of us are even a bit 'unusual', but that human element – guided by the love of Christ, who himself came to earth to live as a human – is what makes education such a fulfilling career and what can make our students' lives rich, connected and meaningful.

As Semester 1 draws to a close and we head into a period of rest before the second half of the school year, now is the perfect time for our students to reflect on what they have achieved so far, set goals for improvement and to consolidate and build their network of support to help them achieve their best.

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Young Women in STEM Event

On Thursday 15 June, a group of Year 10 girls attended a Young Women in STEM event at the University of Adelaide. This event enabled students to apply their problem solving,

communication and collaboration skills to varying activities. We heard from a Master of Philosophy candidate in the Engineering department, who was working on uses of nuclear medicine and diagnostics. It was great to see how enthusiastic she was about her role in STEM and improving outcomes for people undergoing cancer treatment.

Students put their collaboration skills and creativity to the test with a challenge set by the Engineering department – Cantilevers in Action. Using only newspaper and tape, cranes were built to set specifications and then tested for load capacity. All Concordia teams did very well with this challenge. We also learnt about robotics and how this area of development is helping many areas, from medicine to off-planet exploration. This time the task was to build a structure to free a Mars rover that had landed in a crater. This project needed to be achieved within budget and entrepreneurial skills were needed. Another engineering challenge was to build a DC motor with copper wire, a magnet and a battery. It was very valuable to hear from young women in the STEM fields about their journey to where they currently are, and what they think the future holds.

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Year 12 Legal Studies with Dr Sarah Moulds

Dr Sarah Moulds is a senior lecturer in law (UniSA: Justice + Society) and co-founder of the Rights Resource Network SA. She is passionate about parliaments and connecting citizens and communities with law makers. Her most recent book, *Committees of Influence*, explores the important role parliamentary committees play in rights protection in Australia. Dr Moulds has been actively engaged in local, national and international conversations about emergency law-making in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, and the role parliaments can and should play in holding governments to account. In 2022 Dr Moulds was awarded a Churchill Fellowship to explore how to empower young people to engage effectively with Australian parliaments.

Dr Moulds's career has a strong law reform focus and includes seven years at the Law Council of Australia, including as Director of Criminal Law and Human Rights. More recently, she has worked as a Senior Project Officer at the South Australian Law Reform Institute.

Dr Moulds assisted the Year 12 Legal Studies class in developing their research skills to improve their major piece of work for the year, *The Inquiry*.

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Year 9 Interdisciplinary visit to Warrawong Wildlife Sanctuary

As part of their Interdisciplinary Science and Geography studies, Year 9 students engaged in a field study at Warrawong Wildlife Sanctuary in the Adelaide Hills. Students were asked to investigate how Warrawong and similar sanctuaries maintain the health of their biome, including native flora and fauna species.
