It's a feeling I have experienced so many times myself as an actor and it's wonderful to see students walk off stage with that same thrill and actually feel proud of themselves for having given that performance to an audience. As a teacher and a director, small moments are huge successes and it's a privilege to be part of young people's journey to experiencing this as artists.

### 4. If you had a superpower, what would it be?

It would be the power to add an extra few hours to the day, or at least to slow time down or freeze it altogether so I can get everything done that I need to in the day!

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## **RACI Titration Competition**

RACI (Royal Australian Chemical Institute) runs a titration competition for senior Chemistry students each year. In the world of chemistry, titration is a fundamental technique that plays a crucial role in determining the concentration of a substance in a solution. It is used in environmental chemistry, pharmaceutical science and the food industry. This analytical

technique requires a high level of precision and accuracy and enables student to develop their practical skills.

Senior Chemistry students competed in the school phase of the titration competition in groups of three. Two teams (**Lucy 12CFIL, Violet 12KNIC, and Amy 12CFIL; Jasmine 12JLEY, Juliana 12JLEY and Jackson 12JLEY**) had a combined error of less than 2%, meaning that they qualified to be invited to participate in the State round, which occurred in the undergraduate Chemistry laboratory at UniSA. Both teams performed very well, with one team continuing on to the National round of the competition. At the National competition, the Concordia team (**Lucy 12CFIL, Violet 12KNIC, and Amy 12CFIL**) showed very high analytical chemistry skills and were classed as an 'Excellent Team' meaning a combined error of less than 1%. This team was also ranked in the top 10 in the Nation, which is an outstanding result!

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## Year 4 German - "Meine Bohnenpflanze" – "My bean plant"

Over the course of this term, the Year 4 classes have been exploring a unit of work in German titled *"Meine Bohnenpflanze"* (My Bean Plant). This unit connects authentically with Maths and Science (STEM) as well and exploring a range of new German vocabulary and grammar structures in a fun and meaningful way. Students have learnt the origins and history of the story of "Jack and the Beanstalk" in German, how to identify different steps involved in planting a plant, accurately measure objects and use question words effectively to formulate a German question correctly. In addition, students have learnt to make predictions and observations in German through completing a Science experiment.

The culmination of our unit has been conducting an experiment where students are each



growing their own bean seed into maturity. Given the variables of water, light and different soils students have had to predict and observe the changes in their individual bean plants and overwhelmingly students have been excited to see their bean plants grow and change over several days. Students will also have the opportunity to plant their beans in their gardens at home.

It has been great to see students' enthusiasm and excitement throughout this unit of work.

Following this, the Receptions have explored what it means to be a scientist in our Unit of Inquiry about 'How the World Works'. We have learnt how we use our senses to make reasonable predictions and gather information. A highlight was tasting a range of foods and classifying them according to their flavour. The students were excellent risk-takers, trying some familiar foods but also some foods that were little more unusual!

Courtney from SciWorld led us through a range of experiments using everyday ingredients. We practised using the scientific method as we explored how milk and detergent interact, created a lava lamp and slime, and observed an experiment named 'Elephant's Toothpaste'.

The final weeks of term have seen us focus on researching, gathering and representing information while learning about the features of plants and animals. After developing a range of questions and learning how to use non-fiction texts to gather information, the students have chosen an animal to research with the intent to make our own information books.

To top off a wonderful term, the Receptions, Year 1s and Year 2s enjoyed eight days of swimming lessons at the Marion Aquatic Centre. We loved travelling on the bus each day, learning many swimming and water safety skills as well as interacting with peers.

Team Concorde was also highly competitive, while teams Matrix and Raptor both competed well, staying out of trouble for most of the race and confirming four of our teams in the top 11 series standings for the end of the season.

Early on Sunday morning, our Year 7 team, Shockwave, was involved in a large incident

resulting in the trike being damaged and unable to be ridden any further. After 20 minutes off the track and some major repairs the trike got back out on the track and achieved over 400 laps for the race, which was an outstanding result for our Year 7 students.

All teams finished the race strongly, covering a combined distance of over 3,700km in 24 hours. Congratulations to all the students involved this season. Thank you to all the staff and parents for your amazing assistance over the weekend and across the season. We look forward to having a short rest before we start preparing for season 2024. 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## **Forensics at Flinders University**

The Stage 1 Biology students travelled to Flinders University in Week 9 to participate in Forensic Biology practical workshops. The Year 11 Biology students engaged in practical applications of the Biotechnology topic they have been studying. In the university laboratories, the students were shown how to use micropipettes to load samples into agarose gels which were then separated by electrophoresis. The students also analysed DNA profiles from crime scene evidence to determine relationships between trace DNA found at a crime scene and potential suspects.

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## **Inclusive Learning Update**

It has been wonderful to have the opportunity to begin meeting many families, students and teachers at Concordia College since I started as the Inclusive Learning Coordinator in Week 4 of Term 3.

The focus of my role, in conjunction with the Inclusive Learning Team, is to continue working to

further develop and improve our inclusive practice to support the varied needs of all students. As we know, students experience inclusive education when they can access and fully participate in learning, alongside their similar-aged peers, supported by reasonable adjustments and teaching strategies tailored to meet their individual needs.

The Inclusive Learning teacher's key role is to support the classroom teacher in enabling students with disability to access and participate in the curriculum on the same basis as their similar-aged peers. We liaise with parents, classroom teachers and therapists to ensure the educational priorities for students with disability are met. We assist teachers in the provision of resources, create differentiated curriculum plans, and share strategies to enable teachers to work effectively with students with identified needs. We also engage with students to ensure their learning needs are met, to create Student Support Plans and provide additional intervention in collaboration with their class teacher.

Throughout Term 1, Inclusive Learning teachers facilitated SSP meetings. Students who have an identified learning difficulty/disability, and their parent/carers, were invited to attend to establish key learning goals and discuss any specific support needs. During this time, SSP documents were updated and shared with the students' teachers on SEQTA, to enable them to make reasonable adjustments and support students to achieve their specific learning goals. An important part of this process is to review these SSPs to monitor their progress and update their learning goals in preparation for the transition to next year.

Early next term, an email will be sent out for students with an SSP from Years 7 to 11 to meet with the following Inclusive Learning teachers:

- Alva Barton – Years 7 and 8
- Lauren Bone – Years 9 and 10
- Danielle Nak – Years 11 and 12

If you have any questions or concerns about your child's learning needs, please contact the Inclusive Learning teacher for your year level.

We look forward to working in partnership with you and your child to ensure successful learning outcomes.
