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## **From the Futures Coordinator**

With the end of the year fast approaching, it is around this time that choices regarding future subjects, careers and study pathways become front of mind for many students and parents in our community.

This can be a very exciting time; however, it can also cause students, and parents, some anxiety, stress and even dread. Sometimes, it can be a source of conflict.

During this important and often stressful time, I want to share a thought or two that can hopefully relieve some of this pressure and stress for both parents and students.

Whether students get their choice of subjects, degree, career or apprenticeship right straight away or not, it's important to remember that none of these choices are irreversible. Students can transfer degrees based on grade point average (GPA), do postgraduate study, do adult apprenticeships or change apprenticeships, qualify for university through the STAT Test or uniTEST, or gain admission by qualifying through a Diploma or Bridging Course. There is almost always some way or a different way for students to get where they end up wanting to go.

Obviously it would be nice, ideal, more efficient, quicker, and cheaper to get every decision 'right' straight from the start, and it would be good and less stressful if your child "knew what they wanted to do." This is a good aim to have. However, it is not the reality for most people.

Seeing the level of pressure and stress some students feel to "know what they want to do" is concerning. They are teenagers after all; they have been in school their whole life, and they are still figuring out who they are and what they care about.

As parents, we should care, research and be careful and purposeful with these decisions, but let's take the pressure off while still supporting, helping, and guiding to try and get the choices right as best we can. If we get them wrong, let's have the attitude of "it's okay, we can fix it – together."

With the positive and compassionate support of their parents and caregivers, our students will get there.

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## **Brain Bee Challenge State Final**

On Friday 18 August, seven Year 10 students visited the University of Adelaide Health and Medical Sciences building for the State Final of the Australian Brain Bee Challenge. This is the country's only neuroscience competition for high school students. The competition is an opportunity for students to learn more about neurological conditions and brain disorders as well as the structure and function of different sections of the brain.

The students scored among the highest results in South Australia in Round 1 of testing and were invited to compete in the State Final round. To prepare for this competition, these Brain Bee students collectively answered over 18,000 questions about the brain. On the State Final day, as well as undertaking rigorous testing, they visited an anatomy museum and neuroscience lab. They were able to view human brain samples, meet with PhD students undertaking ground-breaking research in spinal cord repair and a range of neurological conditions and see an experiment using Transcranial Magnetic Stimulation. Many students who take part in this competition across Australia go on to incredible careers in medical research and medicine.

We congratulate Josh, Lucas, Jude, Sophie, Alexandra, Ciara and Evelyn on this tremendous

achievement.

We also congratulate our team of four students - Sophie, Alexandra, Ciara and Evelyn - who came third in the state in the team section of the competition. This was an incredible achievement in a highly competitive field.

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## In Memoriam

### Eric Rathjen 1929-2023

On Thursday, 6 July, Eric Rathjen, former Lutheran School leader, died after a very short illness in the Loxton hospital. He was 93 years old.

He completed all of his schooling in Lutheran schools; his primary days at Cambrai Lutheran School and then secondary years at Concordia College, Adelaide, where he had won a scholarship to attend.

In 1948, after completing secondary school, Eric was sent to Kewell Lutheran School (near Murtoa) as a relief teacher for a term. He was then invited to go to Canna, WA to start a small government-subsidised Lutheran School.

His first job as a fully trained teacher was at the Koonibba Lutheran Mission near Ceduna. Eric subsequently served in Henty (NSW), Maitland (SA), Nhill (Vic) and Loxton (SA). Overall, he served in Lutheran Schools for forty-six years, in which he was headmaster/principal for all but one term!

Above all, Eric was a man of God. He saw serving in our schools as a wonderful opportunity to share the gospel with every person who stepped onto the school campus.

Eric is survived by his wife Lois and five children, including Mark, our College Chaplain.

## T.G.D. "Ophie" Renner 1929-2023

On Monday 14 August, Ophie Renner, former Lutheran School leader, died peacefully in his sleep at Wheatfields Residential Care, Freeling. He was 94 years old.

Ophie was born and grew up in Eudunda, one of nine children, (four of whom became Lutheran Pastors). His schooling included Eudunda Primary School, Immanuel College at Walkerville and finally Adelaide Teachers College, Kintore Ave. His first appointment was as sole teacher/principal to Butler Tanks Area School, Eyre Peninsula in 1951 (for three years). Ophie entered the Lutheran System and began principalships firstly in 1954 at Lights Pass Lutheran School in the Barossa Valley, before moving to Lutheran schools at Loxton, St John's Highgate (now Concordia College St John's Campus) and Immanuel Primary, Novar Gardens.

His long-time friend of 80 years and secondary schoolmate Pastor T.T. "Tom" Reuther was principal at Concordia College whilst Ophie was at St John's).

His final appointment for three years was at St Jakobi Lutheran, Lyndoch as a classroom teacher, before he retired in 1994, after 43 years service to education, including 40 years with Lutheran Schools.

In his retirement, Ophie actively tutored and assisted children with learning challenges in Gawler and the district with their education, right up until he turned 90. In 2012, he helped form a local group who assisted and supported dyslexic children. This group quickly grew into Dyslexia SA. He was awarded the SA Senior Citizen of the Year in 2012 for this work.

Above all, Ophie was a man of God, who saw serving in our schools as a wonderful opportunity to share the gospel with every person who stepped onto the school campus, and he did so in a humble, gentle and sincere manner. Education and the journey of children in their formative years was his passion and he lived and breathed the desire to help all children fulfill their potential.

Ophie is survived by his four children (Andrew, James, Elizabeth and Anne - all of whom attended Concordia College in the 1970s and 1980s), five grandchildren (three of whom - Ashley, Oliver & William - also attended Concordia College in the 2000s and 2010s), and four great-grandchildren.
