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From the St John's Campus Primary School Leader

Parents and families are a child's first and most important teachers in the Primary School. When families and schools work together children's learning is enhanced.

Partnerships for learning and wellbeing are about parents, schools and communities working together to ensure that every parent can play a positive role in their child's learning, school community, sport and social life.

Parents and families play an important role in supporting their child's education.

Parental engagement in learning underpins children and young people's cognitive and social and emotional development, shapes family practices and behaviours, and can impact the nature of the school community and the experience of schooling.

There are many ways to support your child with their learning. These include:

- Keep up to date by reading information provided by the school. Attend school events if you can (e.g. Parent Information Evenings, Chapels, Concerts, Student-Led Conferences and Special Events).
- Read together. Create regular opportunities to read for pleasure to or with your child. Together, choose texts from home, school, the local library or online on topics they enjoy or are personally interested in.
- Make sure your child is getting enough sleep. Work with them to develop a regular routine that includes time for meals, homework, play, fun and sufficient sleep.
- Support good relationships. Children tend to do better when they get along with their teacher and classmates. Be positive about school and respectful of teachers. Support good relationships with friends and classmates.
- Ask your child about their learning and school day. Ask them what they enjoyed most about their school day or the most interesting thing they learned. This shows your child that you are interested in their learning and their wellbeing.
- Talk with your child about their friends. If your child is having difficulties with their friends, talk about how they could solve them. If this doesn't work, discuss your concerns with the teacher.
- Accept offers for parent/teacher interviews or contact your child's teacher to talk about how your child is going or to give or ask for feedback. You know your child best and your insights are valuable to your child's teacher. Focus conversations on your child's learning and wellbeing.
- Limit screen time at home. Set up a schedule for time your child can spend on devices such as phones or laptops. Involve your child in other activities such as reading, games or outdoor exercise and play.
- If you have time, you could volunteer to help at the school or in your child's (Primary School) classroom, such as reading or helping on excursions.
- We thank you for your ongoing support, and we look forward to continuing to work in partnership with you to support your child's learning and wellbeing.

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Connecting with the James Dyson Foundation in STEM

The James Dyson Foundation was created to help inspire and support the next generation of engineers. Here at the St John's Campus, we began collaborating with the Foundation in September last year and began introducing a new program in Term 4 with the Year 3 students. This year, the program has so far extended to include the Year 3 and Year 4 cohorts.

Year 3 students are using the air purifier, donated to the school by the Foundation, to help them develop an understanding of what air pollution is and how can we change our habits to create a better future. Students are exploring how air pollution affects people in their everyday lives in different countries and also how Australia is affected by pollution. They are investigating if their route and mode of transport to school changes their pollution footprint, but also their exposure to pollution.

Year 4 students participated in the program in Term 1 this year. They became Design Engineers for a term where they learnt the difference between innovating and inventing. Throughout the term, students chose to work either independently or in groups innovating a product within the classroom. We certainly have some visionaries in this bunch! They went through the motions of picking a product, evaluating the good and bad components of it, then developing a better product based on the changes they wanted to make. Students finished up by creating a cardboard prototype of their new product - just as they do at Dyson in a product's early stages of development!

So far, the program has proved engaging and enlightening for the students. It has gotten them to think outside the box and shown them that the first attempt isn't necessarily the right attempt. I can't wait to see what they do in the future.

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Year 10 Immunisation Program

Immunisation Information for Parents/Legal Guardians of Year 10 Students

Eastern Health Authority (EHA) will be returning to your child's school for the final immunisation visit on **Friday 31 May**.

- **2nd dose of the Meningococcal B (Bexsero) vaccine**

A reminder to parents: Students in Year 10 are offered two free vaccines two months apart to be fully vaccinated against Meningococcal B. It is important that your child is present at school on the day when EHA will be providing second doses.

*** If your child was absent for the first dose two months ago and hasn't been vaccinated (at an EHA clinic or the GP) they can receive the first dose at the second visit.*

Please notify EHA if:

- Your child has already received the second dose with another provider
- You wish to withdraw your consent
- Your child's medical condition has changed

Tips for the day of immunisation:

- Encourage your child to have a good breakfast and recess on the morning of immunisations
- Wear sports uniforms to aid easy access to the upper arm and avoid unnecessarily exposing yourself if clothing needs to be removed/undone
- Encourage your child to keep their arms moving and drink plenty of water throughout the day.

Remember: it is your responsibility to notify EHA of any changes or information, particularly in relation to your child's medical condition, A signed and dated note in your child's diary from a parent or guardian presented on the day is acceptable.

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Australian Computational and Linguistics Olympiad 2024 – OzCLO

Second language learning contributes significantly to the development of linguistic and problem-solving skills and has been described as ‘one of the most complex mental activities you can do’. In fact, research has shown that learning a second language:

- physically changes the brain, increasing the number of neurons and connections between them
- has numerous other benefits, including improving concentration, memory, communication skills and creativity.

Concordia College has an excellent reputation for our language programs and we are well-known for our involvement in the German Exchange. Our staff are very active in Language Associations. As part of our commitment to fostering linguistic extension opportunities, we have a regular lunchtime Language Club, and other special cultural activities occur throughout the year.

In Term 1, 16 students from Years 9, 11 and 12 participated in the Australian Computational and Linguistics Olympiad (OzCLO). OzCLO is a highly regarded and extremely rigorous nationwide competition, where students work in teams under intense time pressure to solve a range of language analysis problems. In 2024, over 660 teams and 2,649 students across Australia took part in the competition, all vying for a place in the national and international

rounds. Concordia entered three senior teams and one junior, and all students can be justly proud of their brilliant teamwork, and of their achievement. Overall, our teams received an impressive three silver awards and one bronze. Congratulations to all students involved.
