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From the Senior School Leader

You may notice that I have chosen the same title for this fortnight's article as utilised by our Middle School Leader, Mr Clay Watkins, in the most recent Concordia Connect. This topic has taken on increased focus for us this term, as we have both been reading the text *'The Anxious*

Generation' by Jonathan Haidt. The central conceit of Haidt's book is this: that since the introduction of social media and the proliferation of its use, the mental health of adolescents around the world has deteriorated. Though the world has changed enormously since the normalisation of social media use around 2010, Haidt argues that the central and consistent factor to explain the phenomenon is the 'great rewiring of childhood.'

As the Senior School Leader, I see firsthand the influence of devices in our students' lives. The role of devices can be quite different in the lives of Senior School students; it is true that they can be a useful tool for learning and, indeed, for creating and sustaining some forms of socialisation. Conversely, I have witnessed firsthand the way personal information shared on social media and messaging apps can be used to do enormous damage to another person. I have seen the way easy access to gambling sites and pornography can shape a young person's life and largely replace real-life interactions.

These, of course, are examples on the more extreme end, but in his book, Haidt talks about the 'opportunity cost' of problematic phone use.

Essentially, he asks the reader: what else could you be doing with the four or five or six or seven hours a day if you weren't spending them on your phone?

This then leads to other questions: what new skill could you learn; which friend could you visit; what service activity might you undertake, if you left your phone at home? Then, what benefit would these things have for your mental health and sense of belonging and connection to others and the world?

While we can't put the genie back in the bottle when it comes to phone use, at Concordia we try to ensure that our students have those crucial opportunities to build relationships, to play at break times and to collaborate and problem solve together. Though the lure of technology can be strong, nothing beats the real world – we must continue to encourage our young people (and ourselves) to look up and around us, to centre ourselves and to find awe and wonder in the beauty and mystery of God's creation.

Our other teams - Matrix, Concorde and Veloci - worked well and gained valuable experience in the trikes throughout the race. By the end of the race we had two of our teams finish in the top 10, which has resulted in three of our teams being positioned in the top five overall for the 2024 series competition standings so far.

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Semester 1 Drama Update

At Concordia, we believe that everything we do in Drama should have an authentic industry and community connection. This year, we have been committed to exploring opportunities for our students to be engaged in industry processes, connecting and working with theatre professionals, and connecting with audiences through presenting our own productions and attending live performances.

Years 7 and 8

In their trimester of Drama, the Year 7s have learned about the theatrical conventions of ancient Greek theatre and applied these techniques to creating their own contemporary morality plays. Meanwhile, the Year 8s have learned storytelling techniques and how to engage young audiences by presenting dramatisations of popular children's books to the ELC students. This has become a staple activity in Year 8 Drama and one that the ELC children look forward to with each rotation of the Drama trimesters. By the end of the trimester, Year 8 students devise, produce and present their own original Children's Theatre performances incorporating puppetry, shadow play and miniaturisation, inspired by local theatre company *Slingsby Presents*.

Year 9

Year 9 students have learned about physical approaches to devising and performing theatre. In Term 1, they produced short original pieces applying the physical devising building blocks of UK theatre company *Frantic Assembly*. The semester ended with a study of the exaggerated performance style of melodrama and the production of an original play I wrote for them titled 'Of Love and Lobsters'. The story of love, intrigue and the triumph of good over evil sees the hero, Alexander Scampi, assemble an entourage to help save his beloved Lady Langoustine from three jealous villains, Baroness Camilla Rusé, Captain Ricardo and Count Vincent Della Courgette. The play contained all the usual melodramatic hallmarks, including heroes, villains, evil sidekicks, the damsel in distress and enough silly action to keep audiences entertained right up until the happy ending. The Year 9s also attended a performance of *The Symphonie of the Bicycle*, written and performed by local actor Hew Parnham at the Space Theatre, Adelaide Festival Centre. Parnham's quick wit and masterful physical comedy helped to inform students to develop their roles in a similar comic and exaggerated style.

Year 10

While there was not a Year 10 Drama class in Semester 1, next semester the Year 10s will begin a practical workshop with local actor and theatremaker Rachel Burke from the State Theatre Company of South Australia. Rachel will guide students in the naturalistic character development techniques of Constantine Stanislavski and prepare students for their first performance in a realistic style. In Semester 2, Year 10 Drama will be taught using the SACE Stage 1 Integrated Learning subject outline, which will allow greater agency for students to apply dramatic theories and processes to inform their practical work through the 'Personal Venture' assessment type. Student learning will culminate in a final performance for which they will have complete creative oversight, including all technical aspects, reflecting the authentic work of theatremakers. Students will also receive 10 SACE credits at Stage 1 for Integrated Learning through this course.

Years 11 and 12

The combined Year 11 and 12 SACE Drama class presented their production of Holly Robinson's play 'small', an episodic drama about a group of people who sign up to a medical trial to be made young again. It explored complex themes such as estranged family relationships, abandonment, terminal illness and mental illness, the ethics involved in medical trials, and the courageous act of growing up. The play was demanding for the company, who rose to the challenge and produced a thought-provoking and emotionally charged performance. Students prepared for their work by viewing 'Guuranda' and 'Black is the Colour of My Voice' in the Adelaide Festival and Adelaide Fringe Festival, and participated in some practical skills workshops with State Theatre actor Nathan O'Keefe.

While the Year 12s now prepare for their externally assessed investigation, the Year 11s will establish a theatre company that they will build over Stage 1 and 2 with a season of works that reflect their company values and mission. Work has already commenced on an original play that is being penned by me and workshopped by the company that deals with the increasing costs of living, homelessness and the quest for authenticity in an artificial world. The play will be performed in Term 4.

The three expectations that we ask all in our community to abide by are:

- greeting the human first before engaging with Coco
- giving lots of space when Coco is moving between spaces
- not standing in groups and staring at her (or calling her name), but keeping moving.

These expectations are strategies to help Coco feel relaxed and settled at school.

Students have also been introduced to the expectations around their behaviour when Coco is in a classroom. This will be reinforced by staff before Coco joins us on campus next term.

Over the holidays we will be filming further educational videos for students, focusing on reading dogs' body language and engaging with Coco in respectful and empathic ways.

We are very grateful to the staff who are doing extra training outside of their teaching hours to enable this student-led initiative to occur.

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Enrichment and Extended Learning News

What a year it has been so far! There are so many amazing opportunities available to our students at Concordia. Here is just a small sample of the wide variety of experiences that have been offered.

da Vinci Decathlon

The da Vinci Decathlon is an academic competition designed to stimulate the minds of students across a variety of disciplines. Named after one of the world's greatest thinkers and scholars, the competition has an emphasis on higher-order thinking skills, problem-solving skills, teamwork and creativity. This competition is perhaps one of the most rigorous academic competitions for young people in Australia.

We had two teams of eight students (Year 7 and Year 9) organise themselves to complete papers in the following categories: Codebreaking, English, Mathematics, Science, Cartography, Engineering, Art & Poetry, Legacy (a type of general knowledge focusing on Leonardo da Vinci and the theme of the day, which this year was Utopia), Ideation, and Creative Producers. On both days of competition there were over 20 schools represented. To place in the top six of any discipline is a notable achievement. Our students worked beautifully together and should be proud of their overall achievement.

- 1st place Art and Poetry
- 1st place Creative Producers
- 3rd place Ideation.

This team also placed highly in Science, Code Breaking and Cartography.

Year 7 team:

- 4th place in Cartography
- High placings in Art and Poetry, Mathematics, and Creative Producers.

Special congratulations to our Year 9 team members who placed in the top three in three of the ten disciplines. They placed fifth in the state overall.

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SchoolTV Special Report: Smokeless Tobacco Products

The evolving nicotine landscape requires parents and caregivers to stay informed to protect

young people from these emerging threats. Snus and nicotine pouches are gaining popularity among young people as smokeless tobacco (SLT) products. Both products are discreetly placed under the upper lip, allowing nicotine absorption through the gums.

Health authorities are urging proactive measures to curb this growing trend and calling on regulators to implement controls before these products become as widespread as vapes. The high nicotine levels in these products pose serious health risks, including nicotine addiction, cardiovascular disease, gum disease, tooth decay and even nicotine poisoning. Researchers highlight the detrimental effects of nicotine on developing brains, linking its use to depression, anxiety, ADHD symptoms and an increased risk of addiction to other drugs.

The marketing of snus and nicotine pouches targets young audiences through social media influencers, raising concerns about their increasing popularity among school students. And like vapes, they come in various flavours and strengths, with unregulated nicotine levels leading to inconsistent and misleading labelling. It is clear that SLT products contain not only nicotine, but also other chemicals with unknown long-term effects.

This Special Report will help you become aware of the potential risks of smokeless tobacco products and guide you in age-appropriate discussions with your child.
