# **Emotional and Social Wellbeing**

From the Primary School to the Senior School, students' emotional and social needs are prioritised through structured programs and pastoral care. In Primary School, students engage in activities that promote self-awareness, empathy and cooperation, helping them build meaningful relationships. Middle School programs focus on fostering resilience, encouraging

students to navigate peer dynamics and challenges with confidence. Senior School offers a safe space for students to reflect on their emotional health, with dedicated staff providing guidance on managing stress, friendships and future aspirations.

# Psychological Wellbeing

Supporting psychological wellbeing is central to our approach. Across all year levels, students have access to mental health resources, including counselling services. In Primary School and Middle School, wellbeing programs help students develop coping strategies for anxiety, self-regulation and emotional expression. Senior students are provided with individualised support as they face increased academic pressures, equipping them with skills to balance their mental health with their studies.

# Spiritual Wellbeing

Our values-based education includes opportunities for spiritual reflection and growth, regardless of individual beliefs. Through Chapel services, mindfulness practices and ethical discussions, students explore their sense of purpose and connection to others. This spiritual exploration encourages students to have compassion, practice ethical decision-making and develop a deeper understanding of themselves and the world around them.

## Personal Development

Our school promotes personal growth through leadership opportunities, service learning, and co-curricular programs. Whether in Primary, Middle or Senior School, students are encouraged to set goals, take on responsibilities and develop skills that prepare them for life beyond the classroom. # **Enrichment and Extended Learning News**

Over the last few weeks, 11 students have participated in the Future Caretakers Project. Year 10 student representatives from three local schools - Concordia, Urrbrae and Glenunga - came together for two half-days to learn about democracy and discuss how young people can have a voice and be empowered, active citizens.

This work is part of an event series funded by the SA Commissioner for Children and Young People, Helen Connolly, and was delivered by the City of Unley. The two days sought to explore ways for young people to provide their thoughts on big global issues and refine a priority list to share with local Ministers, Unley City Council and at a broader public forum. DemocracyCo facilitated both sessions and provided support for students to explore the following questions:

- What could be done to help your voice be heard and enable you to be an active citizen in our democracy?
- What can you do and what could government do?

We used a variety of techniques to develop and critically assess a range of ideas, refining them with expert advice and developing a final list of recommendations.

We were all shocked and saddened when we discovered that in 2016, 50% of the world's populations were living in democracies, now less than 1/3 of the world does! Congratulations to all the students who participated – they were highly engaged, motivated, open to hearing and learning and respectful of others. They left the experience understanding the importance of making your voice count, and the deep responsibility that comes with being caretakers of our precious democracy in the future.

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# St Peters Campus Year 1 Maths Update

Maths lesson are full of challenges, sharing ideas, problem solving and mastering new skills. Quick mental computation both for addition and subtraction is an important mathematical skill for students to master. Here, students play a game with dominoes that requires quick recognition of the group and then use of the count on or count back, doubles or near doubles strategy. Students say the number and give the number sentence and say what strategy they will use. As they become more skilled, this process happens automatically.

Problem solving doesn't have to be about numbers. In our classroom, jigsaw puzzles offer students the opportunity to use their communication and problem solving skills as well as their logistical skills. It is inspiring to hear how students share their ideas and negotiate creating the picture puzzle together. Students have begun using the strategies we have been learning in the Friendology program to avoid conflicts and put forward their ideas and needs with grace.

Then students heard about *The Australian Constitution and our History of Change* from Dr Joe McIntrye, University of South Australia, as well as *Different models of Constitutional Change*. All speakers have worked extensively in constitutional law, making for very informative talks that helped influence debate.

The 2024 South Australian Constitution Convention was an enjoyable experience held in Parliament House. An interesting highlight of the day was the question time was. The students had the opportunity to ask questions regarding the topic of the day or questions about what it's like to be a Member of Parliament.

The debate section of the Constitutional Convention was what everyone was looking forward to all day. Students gathered in the House of Assembly and sat according to their views on the issue. It was interesting to see people from all different backgrounds, schools and areas sharing their opinions and reasoning on the same issue.
