26 Book Challenge

Our student Book Council has worked hard to bring you this year's 26 Book Challenge—**BOOKOPOLY**. We encourage all participating students to update their reading record sheets, and with the term break approaching, it's the perfect time to visit the library and stock up on books.

This year's challenge includes a few tricky categories, but our library staff are here to help! Students have been exploring a variety of sources for their reading, including local libraries, bookshops, second-hand stores, and their own collections at home. Many are also making use of eBooks and audiobooks on the Concordia College Wheelers ePlatform, as well as apps like Libby and Spotify.

As parents and caregivers, you can contribute by fostering open conversations, normalising feelings and breaking down mental health stigmas. Participating in 'R U OK?Day' promotes compassion and shows our dedication to the wellbeing of the entire school community, reaffirming that together, we can truly make a difference.
